Produce Program

LAURIER HEIGHTS' 2020 COMMUNITY SUPPORTED AGRICULTURE (CSA) PROGRAM

Agriculture (CSA) programs connect local farms directly with local consumers for the mutual benefits from buying locally-grown produce. The Laurier Heights CSA Program will launch for a second year this spring and a contact link is provided below for those interested in joining. Here is a summary of CSA goals and its first summer of operations.

By purchasing a subscription to a CSA program in early spring, consumers are guaranteed a weekly supply of fresh local produce during the growing season and gain an understanding of the rigours of produce farming in the process. Because farmers receive payment upfront at the start of the new planting season, typically when expenses are highest, they have the cash resources to cover seeding and production costs and a customer base for their produce.

In 2019, ten Laurier families subscribed to a CSA and converged at the community hall every Wednesday for 14 weeks to receive freshly picked, organic produce from The Golby Farm located 100 km northwest of Edmonton. In 2020, CSA Shares are available for a couple and for a family of four at \$325 and \$575, respectively.

Over the summer, we received the full range of garden vegetables including seven varieties of let-

tuce over two plantings, spinach, kale, radishes, parsley, dill, garlic, rhubarb, green and yellow onions, Swiss chard, kohlrabi, turnips, carrots, parsnips, three varieties of beets and of beans, snap peas, garden peas, green and pickled cucumbers, red and gold raspberries, tomatoes, and, in the final weeks the potatoes (russet, Yukon gold, pink, purple) and zuchinni (green and orange squash, butternut, spaghetti).

The extent of the Golby's production reflected the family's dedication given the risks inherent in farming that summer. The weather posed a particular challenge in 2019 what with spring drought, wet summer, and the briefest of Indian summer. The Golbys also contended with maintaining soil health, seed quality and germination issues beyond their control, disease, parasites, and weeds attacking crops as well as garden invasion from mice and gophers. This is all to be expected on the farm but was managed by the Golbys without pesticides and artificial fertilizers.

Over 2019 and 2020, the Golbys have added to the farm's infrastructure with the installation of an irrigation system and construction of a greenhouse to assist with early spring planting. If interested in the Laurier Heights CSA, for more information contact Brandon Golby at

HOW DO I REGISTER?

Sign in or create an account on to the EMSA Soccer Portal at https://emsasoccerportal.com/ui/?. You must have a current community league membership (19-****) to register. See pages 10-11 for membership purchase.

Payments can be made online but your registration is not complete until your volunteer and uniform deposits have been received by your community soccer coordinator. Make sure you go to the community where your child is planning to play. Volunteer and uniform deposits for Laurier Heights are only required for players U9–U19. If your child is in a younger age division, you are not required to leave deposits, although you are always welcome to help coach your child's team.

Attend one of Laurier's registration dates to verify ID and leave deposits. Please Note - There is no central payment night scheduled this year. If you plan to play Laurier Soccer, you must bring deposits in person (post-dated cheques or cash) to one of our scheduled community registration dates at the Laurier Heights Community League Building, 14405 85 Avenue (Laurier Room):

Tuesday, February 25th, 2020 from 6:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.

Saturday, March 7th, 2020 from 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

UNTIL DEPOSITS ARE RECEIVED, PLAYER REGISTRATION IS NOT CONSIDERED COMPLETE AND YOUR CHILD WILL NOT BE PLACED ON A TEAM.

Any payments made after March 7th, 2020 will be subject to a \$50 late registration fee. Registration fees do not include tournaments; however, they do include team photos.

For all players in age divisions U9-U19, the 2 post-dated cheques required are:

VOLUNTEER DEPOSIT - \$150

One cheque per family, dated for December 31st, 2020 (cheque is shredded upon completion of a minimum 3-hour volunteer duty for EMSA or Laurier Heights Community League)

UNIFORM DEPOSIT - \$50

One cheque per player, dated for July 1st, 2020 (cheque is shredded upon return of team jerseys to the community league)

Deposit requirements are different for each community. It is highly recommended that you contact the community where your child will be playing to attend their registration nights. WHAT SHOULD I BRING TO REGISTRATION?

- 1. Bring one copy of the player's registration form (displayed on phone is acceptable) and the player's Alberta Health Care Card or passport to verify birth date.
- 2. Bring 2 post-dated cheques for volunteer and uniform deposits if your child is in U9-U19.
- 3. If you have not paid online, please bring your cash or cheque payment.
- 4. If you are planning to coach or manage, and do not have a current valid Police Information Check, please bring in a photocopy of any 2 pieces of government-issued ID and your completed Police Information Check and Third Party Notification forms, which can be found on the EMSA West website: https://emsawest.com/sea-son-info/coachs-corner/police-information-check/. You must also register on the EMSA portal at the beginning of each new season as a team official so that we can place you on a team.

"I took hairdressing out of highschool and have been doing hair for 40 plus years, I wouldn't say I know it all but I feel like I have learned a lot over the years." "You don't look a day over twenty," replies Beulah. "That's why you're my favourite Beulah," says Hilary smiling.

A retired RN with nearly 50 years behind her helping others recover and get well, Beulah enjoys having those same kindnesses now shared with her since she's moved into Canterbury.

"They really provide you with a lot of support and help where you need it," says Beulah. Along with her husband, Beulah lived in Edmonton's Westmount neighbourhood in a home they built together when Westmount mall was still being constructed. Nine years ago, after her husband's passing, she moved to Canterbury where she enjoys visits from her three children and eight grandchildren.

7 years at least, and they really do mean a lot. You mourn if they pass away you see them live through changing family situations, you cry with them when they cry and sometimes we just hang out and do nothing, don't we Beulah?"

"That's right," Beulah replies.

No matter your age, self-care is key, but there are certain factors that make it particularly important as you age.

"There's a lot of things you lose as you get older. You lose your job, your independence, but you can still look good and feel good," says Hilary. "To have your hair done gives you that boost and helps you feel a bit better especially if you've had a tough week, you can come and we're here for you to help make you feel better by the time you leave."

With the sweet smells of shampoo and hair product in the air, Beulah is brought back to her childhood while Hilary drys and curls her locks.

"I had really long hair when I was growing up, and I used to wear it in a ponytail," remarks
Beulah. Memory recall is an important part of the beauty routine and one that only gets more impactful when a resident develops dementia. It's an area of care Hilary feels very supported in and is happy to be a part of.

"We consider care on a case by case basis, depending on their mental and physical needs," says Hilary. "And we get a lot of training and support from Canterbury when it comes to dementia care."

"We are all compassionate people and we all care, and I think the residents feel that and know that," says Hilary. "We do," replies Beulah.

Once her hair is styled Hilary helps Beulah out of the salon chair, and as they pass the front desk, Hilary bends down to fix Beulah's twisted pant leg. "Same time, same place?" asks Hilary. "Same time, same place," Beulah replies.
