(MY LAST) PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

HAVING BEEN WITHOUT AN ACTIVE PRESIDENT AT OUR ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING ON MARCH 9TH, 2015, I WAS NOMINATED TO TAKE ON THIS SIGNIFICANT POSITION IN OUR COMMUNITY. I HAD BEEN INVOLVED IN THE LEAGUE PRIOR TO THIS TIME AS THE LEAD OF OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD ENGAGEMENT TEAM (SEE ARTICLE ON PAGE 12) BUT THIS WAS A NEW, CHALLENGING AND RATHER FORMIDABLE ROLE FOR ME TO TAKE ON. I WASN'T SURE IF I WAS UP TO THE TASK (AND I'M STILL NOT) BUT, ALMOST 8 YEARS LATER, I CAN SAY IT HAS BEEN A WONDERFUL, INSPIRING, ENCOURAGING AND LIFE-GIVING EXPERIENCE, THANKS TO YOU! OUR COMMUNITY IS AMAZING!

My work began with re-creating the Board structure in order to facilitate more participation, ownership, and responsibility. We shifted from individuals being responsible for everything in their portfolio to Teams with a new vision and set of values, and a few years later, updated bylaws as well. We became an official Abundant Community Edmonton (ACE) neighbourhood and invested more effort into the exciting work of connecting our blocks. We found our way through challenging conversations with differences of opinion, the Canterbury building project, traffic concerns/safety issues, Heritage kitchen renovations and extensive LED lighting replacements, rink office and washroom upgrades; numerous transitions, grants, projects, programs, events, initiatives like the Food Forest, the installation of solar panels and pickleball courts and, not least on this list, the task of keeping a neighbourhood connected and caring while navigating a pandemic. Those outdoor concerts, plays, book clubs, treasure hunts, painted rocks, decorative hall lighting and Food Forest garden events made a big difference during those difficult years! And so did 'Zoom'!



Over the years, we also learned to 'boo' and 'sock' one another, to light up the night (with Illuminight and better lighting around the hall and rinks), give and receive (our tri-neighbourhood Buy Nothing group now has nearly a 1000 members), to grow and enjoy haskaps and other fruity delights (Check out the Food Forest article on page 9), to meet neighbours and have fun by dinking a wiffle ball with a ping-pong-like-paddle over a tennis net, to keep skating, to be teams working together as many hands (and heads and legs) make light (and fun) work, to appreciating and engaging the time and gifts of diverse citizen neighbours, to... the list could go on and on!

FACILITIES UPDATE

THE FACILITIES DEPARTMENT UNDERTOOK A RINK MAINTENANCE DAY IN OCTOBER AND HAD A GREAT TURNOUT OF VOLUNTEERS TO LEND A HAND. WE SPENT ABOUT TWO TO THREE HOURS CUTTING OUT ROGUE TREES, WEEDS, BRANCHES AND GRASS AND PICKING UP LEAVES AND LITTER TO HELP KEEP THE RINK OPERATING PROPERLY. A BIG **THANK YOU!** TO LEO, WALTER, JEFF, SHARON, CRAIG, BOB, SUZANNE, SHANNON, STEVE AND WILL.

Here is a graph showing the actual electricity production of the solar array on the roof of the Laurier Heights Hall so far in 2022. Any true Edmontonian will recognize how the solar productivity almost exactly follows the solar calendar. During the long, sunny days of summer the productivity is at its highest, and in the dark days of winter the productivity is at its lowest. Why did June dip between May and July? Do you remember "Monsoon June"? Usually the highest producing month, June was bumped into third place this year due to the number of overcast days.

We are currently using the tail end of our big summer utility surpluses and will be having to buy electricity again from the grid for the first time since April. Cross your fingers for a sunny and bright winter!

And all the hard labour was done and continues to be done, by neighbourswell, almost all of it! The ground was so hard that volunteers even when jumping on their spades could not make a dint in the surface! So, one of our volunteer project managers, Steve Wilk, called Len at G and L Enterprises to bring a 16-inch auger on his bobcat to drill holes for the plants. The over 100 boulders were also positioned on the property with the bobcat, to just the right gazebo and the proper prevent vehicle traffic and protect footings and finishings for it - they Esso's monitoring wells.

installation all required a great deal of volunteer time, energy and resources and we were all excited to be able to celebrate our work by enjoying our fall Beer Garden for several years (2013-2015) at Gazebo Park (prior to completing our new building).

But perhaps the most important gazebo park story is that of the Soprovichess, Marie and Doug. They and their company at that time, Aquarian Construction, did a great deal of research and planning to find also did all the labour! Sadly, Doug,







after courageously battling lung cancer, passed away at the age of 51, in November of 2012 and was never able to enjoy it. For this reason, the gazebo is dedicated to him and his memory lives on and is celebrated each time we enjoy it.

As Marie reflected recently, "It definitely was a passion project. It is about 10 years since that gazebo was constructed and it is as strong as ever. I also know that it gets used quite a lot and that makes me (and I am sure many others) very happy!"

Let's continue to keep it beautiful; it belongs to - and is a shared history for all of us.

Reading this twelve years later, in spite of two years of pandemic restrictions, we can see and celebrate how we have been making these dreams, a reality! We may not be 'there yet' but we're on the way and we've come a long way! We are making the road by walking with our growing number of block connectors, our active and expansive League Board and Team structure and more and more households practicing neighbourliness.

If you are not already engaged, please consider where and how you would like to join us in making this neighbourly road of community abundance, care and connection in Laurier. Why? Check out the "Twelve Reasons to Volunteer" on page 3 and find out more about the many opportunities on our Board, Teams and as a Block Connector.

We would like neighbours to get to know each other and "care about each other." We have experienced it in our little nook of the neighbourhood, and it has made a huge difference. At various events, neighbours have made comments such as how they had lived on their street for 17 years without knowing any of their neighbours(!)-- and how nice it is to meet each other; feel like you belong; feel looked after/safer, like someone is watching out for you/your home and especially, to have friends on your own street!

One idea that we have for making this happen on a broader scale, is to have regular (weekly, monthly or bi-weekly) potlucks at the Community Hall to build community connections and neighbourliness, i.e. "promoting family and community" (LHCL mission statement at that time). There is another community league in the city, Highlands, that has been having them every Monday evening for several years with great success. With 18.4% of our households being singles, 12% being widowed and a continual rise in the number of single parent families, there is a growing need for these opportunities to be together.

Another suggestion we would like to propose is a monthly "Good Neighbour" project in which anyone/everyone (whole families- it's great for kids to be a part of these things), would be encouraged to participate. Our street has been doing this in an informal way for the last few years. To make this happen, we would discover and keep track of the many and amazing assets/gifts/skills/expertise of our neighbours and their needsthe senior couple who would like help with yard work; the single parent who requires minor home repairs, the ravine that could use a cleanup, little jobs at the rink or hall, even a project or two that the school or Canterbury Court could use some help with... and then we would disperse volunteers once a month to respond to these needs together. Not only does helping others make us feel good, but it would also make our community/ neighbourhood an even better place to live for all! And if the response continues to multiply, we could reach out to less fortunate neighbourhoods as well.

...Wouldn't it be great to create and nurture a wholistic approach to community engagement and neighbourhood life where all residents feel included, have opportunities to grow personally (become better parents, etc.); to be in community and to use their gifts, talents, and resources to participate in and contribute to our neighbourhood, and the greater Edmonton area?


